ST MARY'S CATHOLIC PRIMARY SCHOOL DETERMINED ADMISSIONS POLICY 2019/2020

The mission at St Mary's Catholic Primary School, Claughton is to;

**Guide all on their journey of faith,
Nurture a love of learning,
Encourage happiness, confidence and personal fulfilment and
Support all in achieving their full potential.**

The number of places available for admission to the Reception Class in the year 2019/20 will be a maximum of 7. This arrangement follows consultation between Governing Body, the Diocesan Trustees, the Local Authority and other admission authorities in the area. The Governors will not place any restrictions on admissions to the Reception Class unless they are advised that the number of children for whom admission is sought is likely to exceed this number. By law, no infant class may contain more than thirty children.

In the event that there are more applicants than places, after admitting pupils with a statement of special educational needs naming the school, the Governing Body will allocate places using the following criteria, which are listed in order of priority:

1. Catholic looked after children and previously looked after children.
2. Baptised Catholic children who live in the Parish of St. Thomas and have a brother or sister in the school at the time.
3. Baptised Catholic children who live in the Parish of St. Thomas.
4. Baptised Catholic children who live outside the Parish of St. Thomas with siblings in school.
5. Baptised Catholic children who live outside the Parish of St. Thomas
6. Looked after children and previously looked after children who are not Catholic.
7. Other children with a sibling in school at the time of expected admission
8. Special medical or social circumstances affecting the child where these needs can only be met at this school.
9. Other children

Notes:

1. "Brother or sister" includes step, half, foster and adopted siblings living at the same address.
2. Where there are more applicants for the available places within a category, the distance between an applicant's home and school is measured. Those living nearest to the school by a straight line (radial) measure, centre of the home to centre of school have priority. Distances are measured using (the Councils' Geographic Information System), this will be used as the final determined factor, nearer addresses having priority over more distant ones. In the event of a tied distance measurement between address points the Local Authority's system of a random draw will determine which address(es) receive the offer(s).

Admissions Information

Last year the school was able to admit all pupils whose parents applied.

Timetable

Applications for admission to the school should be made on the form enclosed with the LEA's brochure or online by the 15th January 2019. If there are more applications than there are places available, the Admissions Committee will meet to allocate places. Letters informing parents of whether or not their child has been allocated a place will be sent out by the Local Authority by the 16th April 2019. Parents of children not admitted will be informed of the reason and offered an alternative place by the Local Authority. It is not normally possible to change the order of your preferences for schools after the closing date.

The law requires that the Governing Body sets up an Admissions Committee to make all decisions about admissions.

Deferred Admission

If your child is due to start school during the next academic year, it is important that you apply for a place for September. If your child's fifth birthday is between the months of September and December, then, if you wish it, admission may be deferred until January; if it is between January and April, then admission may be deferred until the start of the summer term though it is likely to be in your child's interest to start no later than January.

Part Time Provision

Parents can request that their child attends part-time until the child reaches compulsory school age.

Late Applications

Where there are extenuating circumstances for an application being received after the last date for applications, and it is before the Governors have established their list of pupils to be admitted, then it will be considered alongside all the others.

Otherwise, applications, which are received after the last date, will be considered after all the others, and placed on the waiting list in order according to the criteria.

Waiting Lists

Where we have more applications than places, the admissions criteria will be used. Children who are not admitted will have their name placed on a waiting list. The names on this waiting list will be in order resulting from the application of the admissions criteria. Since the date of application cannot be a criterion for the order of names on the waiting list, late applicants for the school will be slotted into the order according to the extent to which they meet the criteria. Thus it is possible that a child who moves into the area later to have a higher priority than one who has been on the waiting list for some time. If a place becomes available within the admission number, the child whose name is at the top of the list will be offered a place. This is not dependent on whether an appeal has been submitted.

This waiting list will operate for the full Autumn Term.

Address of Pupil

The address used on the school's admission form must be the current one at the time of application. If the address changes subsequently, the parents should notify the school. Where the parents live at different addresses, the current-at-the-time-of-application, normal address of the child will be the one used. This will normally be the one where the child wakes up for the majority of Monday to Friday mornings. Parents

may be asked to show evidence of the claim that is being made for the address, e.g. family allowance booklet, identity cards of various sorts showing the child's address as the one claimed. Where there is dispute about the correct address to use, the Governors reserve the right to make enquires of any relevant third parties, e.g. the child's GP.

Twins/Triplets etc

Where there are twins wanting admission and there is only a single place left within the admission number, then the Governing Body will exercise as much flexibility as possible within the requirements on infant class size. If only one place can be offered then the parents will be advised to go to appeal for the other twin, though with the Infant Class Size legislation, it is unlikely that an appeal panel will overturn the decision of the Governing Body. If only a single place can be offered for twins, then the Local Authority's system for a random draw will decide which pupil receives an offer.

Appeals

Where the Governors are unable to offer a place because the school is oversubscribed, parents have the right to appeal to an independent admission appeal panel, set up under the School Standards and Framework Act, 1998, as amended by the Education Act, 2002. Parents should notify the clerk to the Governors at the school within 14 days of receiving the letter refusing a place. Parents will have the opportunity to submit their case to the panel in writing and also to attend in order to present their case. You will normally receive 14 days' notice of the place and time of the hearing.

If your child was refused a place in Reception or Key Stage 1 because of Government limits on Infant class sizes, the grounds on which your appeal could be successful are limited. You would have to show that the decision was one which in the circumstances no reasonable governing would have made, or that your child would have been offered a place if the Governors' admissions arrangements had been properly implemented.

Please note that this right of appeal against the Governors' decision does not prevent you from making an appeal in respect of any other school.

Non-routine Admissions

It sometimes happens that a child needs to change school other than at the "normal" time; such admissions are known as non-routine admissions. Parents wishing their child to attend this school should arrange to visit the school.

All parents requesting a school place, either because they are new to the Lancashire area, or because they are wishing to transfer schools within Lancashire, will be required to complete a Local Authority Application Form, allowing them to express up to three preferences.

Parents who wish their application to this Catholic school to be considered against the priority faith criteria should also complete the school's Supplementary Information Form and return it directly to the school. If the school is oversubscribed with in year admissions at the time of requested admission, failure to complete the Supplementary Information form may result in your application for a place in this school being considered against lower priority criteria.

The admission of all students to St Mary's School will be co-ordinated by the Lancashire Local Authority, (Pupil Access/Admissions Department), in line with recent changes in legislation.

Fraudulent Applications

Where the Governing Body discovers that a child has been awarded a place as the result of an intentionally misleading application from a parent (for example a false claim to residence in the catchment area), which effectively denies a place to a child with a stronger claim, then the Governing Body is required to withdraw the offer of the place. The application will then be considered afresh and a right of appeal if a place is refused.
